



The Season of Easter

Easter isn't just a Sunday — it's a season. One day out of 365 is hardly sufficient to celebrate the great mystery of our faith — that Jesus Christ is risen from the dead. Accordingly, the season of Easter lasts seven weeks (a "week of weeks"), spanning the 50 days from the Sunday of the Resurrection to Pentecost Sunday and encompassing the festival of the Ascension of the Lord.

The season of Easter is intended to be a joyful time for celebrating the presence of the risen



Christ in the church. If your congregation doesn't already celebrate the Lord's Supper (a feast with the risen Lord) each week, the season of Easter is an excellent and appropriate time to explore this practice.

Of course, Easter really isn't just a season either. In the fullest sense, Easter is a new way of life — in which we are "dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 6:11), called to "walk in newness of life" (Rom. 6:4). Every year, for fifty days, the church celebrates and rehearses this new way of life in the Season of Easter — as we await its completion in the fullness of Christ's reign.

A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR...



Dusk had arrived. The time had come. This was the night. Since the ancients didn't have clocks to tell them when it was 12:00 a.m., they told time by the placement of the sun in the sky. For the ancients, a new day began at sundown. Notice the order: "And there was evening and

there was morning, the first day." (Genesis 1:5, and following with each successive day of creation) Easter had arrived.

We gathered on the front lawn around a newly lit fire. Prayers were spoken and sung. We proclaimed the promise of John's Gospel: "The light shines in the darkness and the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it." (John 1:5) With that, the Paschal candle was lighted and we followed it into the sanctuary to receive the Easter proclamation, that Christ is risen from the dead.

We had gathered, of course, for the Great Vigil of Easter, the night of all nights when we gather in the holy silence of anticipation and expectancy, and relive our holy story as God's people by hearing, again, the stories that tell of God's salvation history, God's deliverance of God's people throughout time. This is the night we tell our name to ourselves. We belong to God.

There are many readings, many stories that are told that night, but there are two, in particular, that are told every year at the Easter Vigil, one from each Testament. From the Old Testament, we hear the story of the Exodus, which is the faithdefining story at the heart of Judaism. It tells of how God delivered (saved) the Israelites from slavery to sin in Egypt, to freedom as God's covenant people who would be a blessing to all nations. From the New Testament, we hear the story of the Resurrection of Christ, the faith-defining story of at the heart of Christianity. It tells of how God delivered (saved) the whole of creation from slavery to the old life of sin and brokenness, to the freedom of living newness of life in the gracious promises of Christ in baptism. One of the many

results of this is that it enables us to focus on freely serving our neighbor in need, rather than becoming focused solely on our own salvation.

There are other stories, as well. The story of creation, and how it all began. The story of Noah and the flood, and how God tried to begin again. The story of Abraham and Isaac, and how God provides. The stories of the prophets, who continually call us back to our covenant with God. However, through the prayers and the liturgy, images again and again speak of the Exodus from Egypt, God's salvation of the Israelites through the waters of the Red Sea.

This year we were gifted with an original painting by Bob Dencker for the Easter Vigil that will remain in the chancel for the season of Eastertide. It depicts the salvation of the Israelites with God as the pillar of fire by night, leading the Israelites through the Red Sea to freedom. Just so, the Paschal candle is our pillar of fire and the waters of the baptismal font are our local Red Sea. On that night, we gathered around the font to give witness to God's salvation, as we celebrated the baptism of Gregory Ryan Marshall. (And on Easter morning, we did the same with Patrick Grant Tilk.) Other Travelers along *The Journey*. likewise gathered to affirm and give thanks for the covenant promises of their baptism. It was a sight to behold, and a holy one at that!

As the waters came back together, we came to the Lord's Table to share the meal, nourishment for our journey that is this life of faith. This was the tenth time New Hope has gathered for the Easter Vigil. This first service of the Easter season ended with the chant still ringing in our ears: "Christ is risen, indeed! Alleluia! Amen." If you missed it, rest assured, we'll gather again next year. Mark your calendars now. Sunset, April 15, 2017.
