MUSIC NOTES

Composer Louis Bourgeois (ca. 1510-1561) was born in Paris but moved to Geneva in 1541 and lived there until 1557. Bourgeois was a friend of John Calvin. Bourgeois and others contributed tunes for the Genevan Psalter, including GENEVAN 42 and OLD HUDREDTH. Today's hymn *I Believe in God the Father* is set to the tune GENEVAN 42, which would have been used to sing the text of the 42nd psalm. The most familiar of the psalm tunes from the Genevan Psalter is OLD HUNDREDTH. We frequently sing this tune for *The Doxology*, or "Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow".

Endings & Beginnings: The Rite of Ordination & Installation New Hope Presbyterian Church, January 15, 2017

Today we celebrate the ordination and installation of Deacons and Ruling Elders. The Presbyterian Church (USA) as a denomination is defined by its theology and that theology directly informs our governing structure, or polity. The name *Presbyterian* comes from the Greek word that means "elder" or "wisest one." With Christ as the head of the church, we have established a system for governance that is representative and democratic. Power and authority are not held by a bishop, as in more hierarchical denominations, but by the assembled body of presbyters which consists of both elders (also known as "ruling elders"), who are elected by congregations and ordained by Sessions, and Ministers of Word and Sacrament (also known as "teaching elders"). We value shared authority and power and so we work together with other congregations within a structure called a Presbytery, in a region called a Synod, and as a national body called the General Assembly.

Ruling elders, together with Ministers of Word and Sacrament (teaching elders), make up the Session of the congregation. The function of the Session is to govern the life of the congregation. Deacons make up the Diaconate or Board of Deacons, and serve to care for the members of the congregation, as well as minister to the needs of the larger community. Each year, the congregation is asked to nominate from among its members, people to serve as ruling elders and deacons. The Nominating Committee prays over those nominations and presents a slate of nominees to the congregation to be voted upon and elected to those respective ordered ministries. Once a person is ordained to the office of elder or deacon, that person is an elder or deacon, respectively, for life. Once that person's term of active service on the Session or Diaconate is over, that person can be called again through the voice of the church to serve another term. When that happens, he or she is not re-ordained, but rather is installed again to active service. The service of ordination and installation is rooted in the baptismal covenant of the church. All candidates for ordination and/or installation, as well as all the baptized of the congregation are reminded of their own calls to discipleship in Jesus Christ.

Today, eleven members of New Hope are being ordained and/or installed to service as ruling elders and deacons in and for the church. Sharon Barnes and Jennifer Bommarito are being ordained and installed as Deacons. Deacons Bob Dencker, Carolyn Doerr, Linda Judd and Stan Whiteley are being installed to active service on the Diaconate. Jerry Dyer, Bill Lamey and Alyssa Murray are being ordained and installed as Ruling Elders. Elders Kirk Garten and Sue White are being installed to active service on the Session.

Just as today is a beginning for those named above, it is also an ending for elders and deacons who are completing their terms of service. Ruling elders **Sam Connor, Linda Dencker, Shelley Geiger, Craig Graber, Bill Pires** and **Jim Salter** are ending their active service on the Session today; and Deacons **Earl Bostic, Ruth Connor, Marion Hamilton** and **Stan Whiteley** are ending their service on the Diaconate. (Stan Whiteley is being installed on the Diaconate today to fill a one-year term.) These elders and deacons have led this congregation well over the past several years in faithful leadership and service. Let us join together in thanksgiving and gratitude for their ministry.
