New Hope— Earth Care Congregation

New Hope completed the Earth Care audit and we received our recertification as an Earth Care Congregation in March 2018. The Earth Care audit measures accomplishments or progress in four key areas of congregational life: Worship, Education, Facilities, and Outreach. To receive certification as an Earth Care Congregation, we must show activity, emphasis, or progress within each of these areas of focus in our attention to caring for creation. This is measured in achieving a point-total of 25 in each area of focus, for a total of 100 points needed for certification.

We will promote the stewardship of creation by becoming an "earth care congregation" of the Presbyterian Church (USA). Care for our environment is a prominent theme in scripture and a great concern for our time, especially our younger generation. By doing this, we hope to welcome and include all, serve others and be God's love in the world.



Earth Day is Sunday April 22, 2018. New Hope wants to celebrate Earth Day and also participate in earth friendly events. The first a collection of electronic device no longer used. This is to promote recycling electronics at the end of their useful life. Here are a few reasons this is important:

- 1. Electronics contain precious resources that are wasted when buried in a landfill. For example the EPA reports recycling one million cell phones recovers 50 pounds of gold, 550 pounds of silver, 20 pounds of palladium, and 35,000 pounds of copper.
- 2. Some components of electronics contain toxic and hazardous materials, especially old tube televisions and CRT computer monitors. One CRT can contain 5-8 pounds of lead!
- Recycling electronics creates local jobs. According to the coalition for American Electronics Recycling, every 172,000 pounds of electronics recycled creates one job directly, indirectly creates two additional jobs.

Music Notes

"In the churches of the Reformation there have been two main streams of church song. On the one hand, there has been hymnody with Luther as its fountain head; on the other, metrical psalmody after the example set by [John] Calvin. Luther carried on the tradition established by the Latin hymn; Calvin gave his adherence to a still older tradition...the...days when the Church had no other means than the psalms for the singing of its praise." (Millar Patrick, *The Story of the Church's Song*).

John Calvin believed that the best songs for praising God were the "Psalms of David, made and imparted by the Holy Spirit" so that "the words come from God." The church had discovered that by employing non scriptural texts, heresies and unorthodoxy had proliferated. So Calvin and others began to translate the psalms into French and turn them into metered, rhyming, paraphrased versions of these texts. Calvin required the music for the psalms to be "... simple, to carry majesty suitable to the subject, and to be fit to be sung in church." Psalms were sung only in unison, and no instrumental accompaniment was allowed in worship. One of the more famous songs from this time is the tune of OLD HUNDREDTH to which we sing the text *Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow*.

Numerous "Psalters" were published on the Continent, in England, and eventually even in America. In fact, the first book published in America was a psalter, the *Bay Psalm Book*, 1640. But by the end of the 17th century, metrical psalmody was "deplorable in the extreme" according to Millar Patrick. Just at that time the first important author of English language hymnody began to write hymn texts. Who was he? Are some of his hymns still sung to this day? See next month's Music Notes.
